Until your contributions roll in, here are a few recommendations:

"Frangipani" by Celestine Hitiura Vaite is a lighthearted look at another culture; set in Tahiti, Barbara Paterson recommends this book, especially for these chilly days.

"The Giver of Stars" by Jojo Moyes – Jane LePorte and Lois Lindsay liked this fictionalized true story of the Packhorse Librarians, a U.S. WPA program in eastern Kentucky 1935-1942.

"All the Devils are Here" by Louise Penny – Barbara Wynn mentioned it first, but this mystery seems to be very, very popular.

Recent speakers have also written books:

"How Will You Be Remembered" by Robb Lucy – about Creating and Sharing Life Stories; many of us had the author sign our books at the January 2020 meeting.

"Amazon Woman" by Darcy Gaechter, who spoke in November 2020 – kayaking the Amazon River, Source to Sea, available in our local bookstores.

"Show Me the Honey" by Dave Doroghy – spoke about beekeeping on a float home in Ladner in January 2021; this book is also in our local bookstores.

In the works – Scott McIntyre, co-founder of Douglas and McIntyre publishing, in December 2020 he told us he is currently writing his own book.

#### February Speaker - Valerie Jerome

Valerie opened our eyes to the racism in our backyards, our communities, and our country. Valerie spoke of the racism in every level of our educational system; grades K to 12 and our universities. She spoke of incidents that impacted her from early days in North Vancouver from her first day of school when she was pelted with stones and only one other child objected. Different, although non-violent, incidents continue during her 36 years of teaching in elementary school, and today in our community.

She depicted the structure of racism in our schools, through the image of layers of gatekeepers - in the Ministry of Education, the Faculties of Education, the local School Boards, principals, and teachers - illustrated by shocking personal stories.

While the curriculum is beginning to change, what is more important are the attitudes and what is in the hearts and minds of those in charge of delivery. It takes the will of everyone to see, to acknowledge and to stand against racism at every level in the educational system. Bullying for any reason, and towards any person, is totally unacceptable in a country which embraces diversity.

Thanks to Valerie's long-time friend, Lucile Flavelle, for writing these key points:
