Speaker: Dan Levitt



May Speaker – Dr. Catherine Johnson, Professor of Geophysics, UBC

Dr. Johnson was extremely engaging as she shared her knowledge and passion to discover the interior mysteries of rocky planets, moons and asteroids. She is currently Co-Investigator of NASA's InSight mission to Mars which was the topic of her talk.

The InSight Mission lander was launched in May 2018 from California in dense fog and touched down on Mars in November 2018, with the camera lens covered in dust. Its specific purpose is to study the deep interior of Mars for the first time, taking the planet's vital signs, its pulse and temperature. As it is important to know where the interior core is and the thickness of the crust, two radio antennas send signals to Earth to confirm the lander's position as Mars "wibbles and wobbles" as it revolves on its axis.

The lander is only 10 meters wide (including two large solar panels) and two meters high. All the many instruments need to be tiny and light in order to be launched and still accomplish many sensitive tasks. The landing site is in a boring (Dr. Johnson's description) flat area, as the engineers always want to ensure a safe landing, although there is interesting terrain about 1000 km away -- a once active volcano.



A robotic arm unpacked and put the instruments in place, very slowly and carefully. Waiting to measure the first seismic event took patience but finally a marsquake of magnitude 3.7 was recorded in April 2019.

Much is known about the surface of Mars from other missions; its days are 25 hours long and years are nearly twice the length of our Earth year. It is now very dry but was

once wet in places and is very rocky and windy. The temperatures at night are minus 110/120°C and a balmy 5/20°C at noon. The atmosphere is 95% carbon dioxide and the core is molten liquid iron. Mars does not have a magnetic atmosphere now but three to four billion years ago it did.

Like much of science, exploring Mars takes patience and enduring the question "why". The scientific reasons for going to Mars can be summarized by the search for life, understanding the surface and the planet's evolution, and preparing for future human exploration.

Regarding humans traveling to Mars, Dr. Catherine feels Elon Musk may arrange a travel package, but as nothing physical has returned from Mars, it may be a one-way trip (don't forget your toothbrush). She hazarded a guess that it will be at least two decades before people go to Mars. Most of us are looking forward to any trip on Earth.

Mary Newman recapped a wealth of information, with some input from Jane LePorte. Jane LePorte introduced the speaker and Barbara Wynn thanked her.

Aphid Spray from Rhubarb Leaves

3-4 large rhubarb leaves (no stalks). Chop leaves roughly. 4 cups water in a pot. Bring to a boil.

Add 2 cups coarsely cut rhubarb to boiling water; turn down heat and simmer for 30 minutes.

Remove from stove and allow to cool.

Strain into a bowl pressing the leaves in the strainer to extract all the compounds.



Mix 1 teaspoon liquid dish soap with 2-1/2 cups cold water.

Blend rhubarb infusion with the soapy water and pour into a spray bottle. Reserve remainder in tightly sealed glass jar.

Spray plants to kill aphids and other disruptive insects.

DO NOT USE ON VEGETABLES OR FRUIT.

If you wish, you could do a trial spray to see if there is any adverse effect on the plant.
