Douglas Justice is the Associate Director, Horticulture & Collections, at UBC Botanical Garden, an adjunct professor in the School of Architecture and Landscape Architecture at UBC, and the Program Manager and an instructor for the Botanical Garden's Horticulture Training Program.

He is also an active member of a number of local, national and international plant and garden organizations. Douglas co-authored The Jade Garden: New and Notable Plants from Asia, with UBC Botanical Garden colleagues Brent Hine and Peter Wharton.

He wrote a Field Guide to Ornamental Cherries in Vancouver with volunteers from the Vancouver Cherry Blossom Festival, and recently co-authored the book, The Lives of Leaves with Dan Crowley.

Douglas wrote the text for the mobile app Vancouver Trees and is now working to complete a similar volume describing cultivated shrubs in Vancouver.

Sheryl MacKay

-Life on the Air

For twenty-two years many of us began our Saturdays and Sundays listening to Sheryl on CBC's North by Northwest program.

An intoxicating love of radio was first instilled as a child listening to PEI stations, and when the wave lengths permitted, New York stations in the evenings where interesting, exotic (rock) music was played.

University was recommended and Sheryl graduated from SFU, and deferring law school, began her career with CBC in the early 80's as a researcher on a weekday program "Daybreak". Bob Sharples was the host and he was life-changing for Sheryl's career when he acted as ombudsman for the people who called in after the show with their concerns.

Sheryl returned to her Prince Edward Island roots to produce an afternoon show featuring history, community, arts, and personal stories; themes she has continued throughout her career.

She traveled through PEI and met one farmer whose barn had burned down with all cattle lost; Sheryl, the farmer, cameraman, and no doubt the audience were in floods of tears in the one minute segment. After learning of a man taping personal stories, some of which she used in her show, she encouraged him to do more and hundreds of these oral stories are now archived at the University of PEI.

After enrolling in a community college course in journalism she found the class had to self-teach as the once renowned professor did not come to classes due to a problem with alcohol.

Sheryl returned to BC and joined North by Northwest. She told us about some of her memorable interviews, some early ones causing great trepidation and anxiety:

Salman Rushdie dispelled her fears when he told her a pre-show hilarious story about visiting Bono with

Van Morrison and bouncing around on pogo sticks in Bono's living room. Salman turned out to be a great comedian on air.

Margaret Atwood seemed unfriendly but actually *couldn't* shake hands as it was during SARS and she had come from Toronto.

Alexander McCall-Smith was another delightful guest.

Curtis Stone - a very handsome Australian chef

Anthony Bourdain visited three times, and was delightful and handsome.

June Goldsmith joined Sheryl "on the road" to encourage local performers

Frank Ritchie did hiking suggestions (he will do podcasts also)

The only difficult interview was with someone who did not have a command of English.

Sheryl's very favorite interviews were with people who had never been interviewed before who thought they had nothing to say. They thoroughly enjoyed telling their story.

A big regret, she didn't make a list of the hundreds of people she interviewed.

Did any Women's PROBUS members participate in the scarf exchange?

Traveling around the Province to many remote places led to interesting experiences:

- Courtney music fest almost no internet connection
- Fort St. John minus 43 degrees and mid program the power went out
- Kelowna no one came
- Victoria people came in their pj's from nearby houseboats
